Readings: Philippians 2. 5-11 Matthew 21. 1-11 Reflection

That day there were two very different processions going into Jerusalem, from different sides of the city, although probably not at the same time. Pontius Pilate, governor of the region was there with his whole army, processing in all their finery through the streets. A warning in case anyone needed it that there would be no uprising this Passover.

Then there was the small procession entering on other side of the city. Made up of Jesus and his disciples, with Jesus seated upon a donkey, fulfilling the words found in the prophet Zechariah (9:9) "Say to the Daughter of Zion, 'See, your king comes to you, gentle and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey.'"

These two processions gave very different messages to those that witnessed them that day. Pilate, with his hundreds of centurions and foot soldiers and all the pomp and ceremony that went with such a parade, was making sure that everyone could see the power and might of the Roman Empire. And then be in no doubt of what end would come to anyone who dared rise up in rebellion in an attempt to get rid of the Romans. Jesus, riding on a young donkey, entering humbly, embodying the peace that God brings to His people. It wasn't quite the way that people expected the Messiah, their long awaited King to come!

Many who cheered that day were still hoping for a King that would unseat the Romans by raising up an army of his own to give Israel back to its people. But God had promised them a king who would be different from any king they had known. In their desire to rout the Romans it appeared that the people had forgotten this, because in less than a week they turned on him, along with the rulers.

If you had been in Jerusalem that day, and had seen both processions passing by, which would you have chosen to follow?

In some ways that is the choice we make each day. To choose power and might over love. To choose "the way things are done" over "the way God intends them to be."

A time of prayer

Keep us, good Lord, under the shadow of your mercy in this time of uncertainty and distress. Sustain and support the anxious and the fearful, and lift up all those who are brought low; that we may rejoice in your comfort knowing that nothing can separate us from your love.

Lord Jesus, you taught us to love our neighbour and to care for those in need, as if we were caring for you. In this time of anxiety give us the strength we need to share in your ministry, to be a strength to the fearful and to assure the isolated of your goodness and love.

God of compassion, embrace those who are ill with the coronavirus and those suffering any kind of disease. Be close to the dying and hold those who are bereaved. Be hope in their darkness and let your love radiate peace into the hearts.
